CHAIRMAN'S FOREWORD

Sports development is a cause that I hold dear to my heart. For most of my life, I have been active in the development of sports in the country. And throughout my many years of involvement, what stands out to me is the high discipline level and impressive performance and achievements of female athletes, even though they happen to be the least supported and funded in Malaysia. Therefore, I am immensely proud that YSD is a strong contributor to their cause. Even so, much more support is needed for women's and girls' development in sport, and I urge all stakeholders to stand with us in this cause.

YSD's support for the development of grassroots as well as elite female cricket athletes in collaboration with the Malaysian Cricket Association since 2020 has seen the women's national cricket team surpassing expectations and successfully placing themselves firmly on the world stage. In 2022, for the very first time in Malaysian history, the national women's team qualified based on merit for the ACC Asia Cup 2022 held in Bangladesh. This is the most coveted championship in Asia, with the four full member countries competing, i.e., India, Pakistan, Sri Lanka and Bangladesh. In the qualifier which was held in Kuala Lumpur, they competed spectacularly against the best non-test nations in Asia, such as The United Arab Emirates, Hong Kong, Nepal, Qatar and Bhutan. On top of that, I am exceedingly proud that one of our U19 players, Nur Dania Syuhada, achieved the highest number of wickets for Malaysia at the ACC Asia Cup. Our women's team has improved leaps and bounds over the years despite setbacks that include the COVID-19 pandemic, and they have proven that they are now a force to be reckoned with!

At the 32nd SEA Games 2023, we are also proud that Ng Jing Xuen, whom YSD supports in collaboration with the Malaysian Ladies Golf Association, claimed a gold in the individual category. She is indeed a rising star in golf!

Under our Education pillar, we provided 292 scholarships to high-performing and deserving individuals who are mostly from the B40 group across the country, with more than 100 trained in vocational programmes. We hope to assist even more B40 students in the future to complete their TVET education and be placed in potentially high-paying jobs.

We had also ramped up back-to-school aid for underprivileged students attending primary and secondary schools with the onground support of the Sime Darby companies. A total of 9,398 students have received back-to-school aid this year that included items such as bags, stationery sets and vouchers for school uniforms, shoes, socks, books, and other necessities. In March and April alone, together with Sime Darby Property, we provided back-to-school aid to 2,772 students, which is the highest number of recipients in one back-to-school project we've had!

Certain back-to-school aid initiatives this year, such as those in Johor, Kelantan, and Terengganu, took place together with the aid distribution conducted under the YSD Disaster Relief Fund within our Community & Health pillar. With the compassion of the Sime Darby companies, we were provided with volunteers on the ground to ensure that the school students affected by the floods were provided with the support they needed to continue going to school and continue their studies worry-free despite their hardships.

We ramped up our work under the Environment pillar to improve and conserve biodiversity while acting against climate change. Aside from tree planting and habitat restoration, we remain steadfast in our dedication to the survival of endangered species such as the Malayan Tiger, especially against poaching. I am also proud to say that we are slowly taking a step back from sponsoring the Bornean Sun Bear Conservation Centre (BSBCC) because the centre is now self-sustaining once again after the pandemic, which is indeed an inspiring success story.

Our strategic partners have also made great strides in manoeuvring the complex nature of environmental conservation such as by working with the judicial authorities for law enforcement in combatting poaching, developing and implementing state action plans as well as industry and state policies, and conducting research within the many layers of ecosystem conservation.

An event I am very much looking forward to is the YSD Arts Festival 2023, which is the largest free-for-all arts festival in the country that promotes inclusivity and sustainability! I am also proud that arts projects that we have supported have achieved so much impact in the country and globally. This includes "A Notional History" by Five Arts Centre which we supported in 2020, which has now been showcased in Japan and Berlin, with other countries in the line-up, to acclaimed reviews. This theatre performance was also a winner of a few prestigious awards at the recent 18th BOH Cameronian Arts Awards. YSD's support has also facilitated arts to be brought to the Malaysian public, such as through our collaboration with Think City in "Arts On The Move" showcased at the Pasar Seni MRT Station for commuters, and also for the "Art Murals & Sculptures in Alleyways", a series of exhibitions and workshops in Kuching, Sarawak.

All the achievements this year would not have been possible without the contributions of my fellow YSD Governing Council members, as well as the hardworking YSD operations team, who worked with our partners towards achieving the best outcomes and impact.

While we see the great successes of the initiatives that we invested in the year, there is still much to be done in environmental conservation and the betterment of society. With the long-term support of Sime Darby Plantation, Sime Darby Berhad, and Sime Darby Property, we look forward to making further progress in inclusivity and sustainability.

CEO'S REVIEW

At Yayasan Sime Darby, we are cognisant of the fact that communities form the foundation for making a sustainable change in society and the environment. With the increase in the number of engagements and activities conducted with our project partners on the ground, I find that most striking to me is the strength of communities in making a positive and long-term impact.

This year, we were taken by surprise that the annual floods affecting Malaysia had extended way beyond the usual year-end period, which is another clear sign that the climate change catastrophe is already upon us. Although we saw warnings for early, heavy rainfall beginning in November 2022, we were shocked that devastating floods continued to affect several areas until March 2023; particularly in Johor, Kelantan, and Terengganu, that affected tens of thousands of people in each of these states.

With this unexpected adversity, our team bucked up once again and activated the YSD Huluran Kasih employee volunteer programme and worked closely with Sime Darby Plantation, Sime Darby Berhad and Sime Darby Property in assisting communities in need. Even though many were badly affected by the flood themselves, the selfless employee volunteers stood united in distributing critical food and hygiene items to aid in hard-to-reach places which were cut off due to the floods.

Utilising the YSD Disaster Relief Fund, more than 20 aid distribution engagements took place to assist individuals from the lower-income communities, as well as teachers and students in affected areas. Towards the tail end of the distribution period, we were amazed at the tenacity of Sime Darby Plantation volunteer employees, who were resolute in their aim to provide back-to-school and post-flood aid to communities in and around their township areas. It was indeed a challenging 2 weeks of back-to-back distribution with them. However, YSD believes that helping those in most need is always worth the effort and hardships, especially when we witness the happy faces when they receive the meaningful aid, despite the calamity that had befallen them.

This year, YSD employee volunteers visited the local community who were mainly B40s in Sitiawan, Manjung, Perak for a mangrove tree planting programme while building knowledge about why mangrove is critical to be conserved to fight the disastrous effects of climate change. Under YSD's partnership with Global Environment Centre (GEC) in the mangrove conservation project there, the communities were provided with the knowledge and means to plant and preserve the mangrove, while building a livelihood from the mangrove sustainably.

Sahabat Hutan Bakau Kuala Gula (SHBKG) and Sahabat Hutan Bakau Kampung Pasir Panjang Laut (SHBKPPL) are the two community-led mangrove conservationist groups, made up of passionate community members committed to improving the mangrove sites in their respective towns. With YSD's support, GEC's engagement with both SHBKG and SHBKPPL over the years have resulted in the local communities understanding the importance of the mangrove towards both their safety and livelihood. As a result of the determination and hard work of the community members, the highly eroded and degraded coastal areas in Manjung, Perak have seen much positive improvement. Hearing firsthand from the community members about how much they love their mangrove trees and witnessing for ourselves the amount of hard work put towards planting mangrove seedlings and maintaining the trees was truly awe-inspiring!

We are also keen on ramping up our support for Orang Asli communities across our pillars. In the Royal Belum State Park, our support for Persatuan Pelindung Harimau Malaysia (RIMAU) has allowed for the setting up of anti-poaching patrollers, namely Menraq – fully made up of Orang Asli individuals. Similarly, in Kenyir State Park, a patrolling team was set up by Nature Based Solutions with a few members from the local Orang Asli community.



With the support of the Orang Asli patrollers, their respective villages are also contributing towards anti-poaching efforts, being the eyes and ears on the ground, which is a clear achievement of communities coming together towards a common goal.

In expanding our support for the Orang Asli communities, we are working on increasing their basic access to education, which is in line with our Education pillar goal of Education for All. Our long-term partner, Institute for Democracy and Economic Affairs (IDEAS), is currently in the second phase of YSD support to enable them to continue their important work in Orang Asli education. They are continuously engaging with the Ministry of Education and other important stakeholders, with important legwork towards achieving this goal with us.

YSD has awarded 171 scholarships to persons with disabilities (PwD) to date. We are continually inspired by PwD whom we have supported over the years. We have been so blessed to have met with PwD in our programmes whose determination and motivation to push through their difficulties can surpass most other individuals. One of our scholars, Muhammad Firdaus Abu Hassan is totally blind and comes from an extremely poor family of 8 siblings, but is an exemplary YSD scholar despite his life challenges. He had completed his bachelor's degree and master's degree with flying colours from Universiti Malaya under our scholarship. And although he already had a job at the university as Assistant Registrar, he received a third YSD scholarship to further his studies to pursue a PhD in Disability Equality Training which is a great show of leadership and inspiration for PwD across the nation.

Another YSD scholar whom we are exceedingly proud of is Krithin Paul Pereira, who embodies the true spirit of resilience, perseverance, and unwavering optimism. Despite living with cerebral palsy, Krithin has already achieved so much at a young age, serving as an inspiration to us all. His passion for automobiles has led him to pursue his Diploma in Automotive Engineering at Young Aces Technical College, which YSD is honoured to provide him a scholarship for. Not only does Krithin overcome all limitations imposed by his condition, he is also an exemplary YSD scholar who deservedly received the YSD Inspirational Award during the recent YSD TVET Day Celebration. Krithin's journey is a powerful testament to the indomitable human spirit, reminding us that with determination, compassion, and support, every individual has the potential to create a profound and positive impact on society.

YSD also sponsors the IDEAS Autism Centre (IAC) to enable the underprivileged to have access to special education, so that these autistic children may be ready to enter mainstream school one day. Aside from this, YSD's support also facilitates IAC to provide advice, training, and education modules to other early intervention centres who need the technical expertise to start their operations and grow, for the benefit of all children living with autism in Malaysia.

Our determination to support PwD is a mainstay in our plans for YSD. This year, we hosted our very first celebration of International Day for Persons with Disabilities where we were honoured to host YBhg Datuk Dr Ras Adiba Mohd Radzi, who is a renowned advocate for PwDs in Malaysia, and an avid supporter of YSD's work with PwD. Our PwD scholars bedazzled the audience during the speaker panel session, where they inspired everyone with their talent and resilience.

Additionally, we are also hosting the YSD Arts Festival (YSDAF) 2023, Malaysia's largest free-for-all arts festival after a 5-year hiatus. YSD is working with the Kuala Lumpur Performing Arts Centre (klpac) to ensure that inclusivity as well as sustainability are at the forefront of this highly anticipated arts festival. We target to touch almost 20,000 people with the power of the arts to encourage sustainable living, provide a platform for the marginalised to give to and take in the arts, provide knowledge on climate action, and highlight important causes to be supported. We wish to enable those who have never experienced the arts before to do so; irrespective of their backgrounds, age, and abilities.

YSD is also the longest supporter of Cancer Research Malaysia (CRMY) critical work as they are the only organisation focusing on Asian cancer. And our funds had enabled CRMY to set up and develop the Patient Navigation Programme (PNP) with the objective of saving the lives of B40 women with breast cancer, where timely diagnosis and treatment may be provided to these women to ensure seamless, coordinated care and services. More than 3,000 women have benefitted from the PNP in just four hospitals across the country, and we are keen to support CRMY to bring this successful programme to even more needy women.

All of these positive impact in the lives of others and the inspirational success stories that come with them are only made possible because of the guidance of our Chairman and Council members; the generous donations of Sime Darby Plantation, Sime Darby Berhad and Sime Darby Property; our ever-determined project partners; and of course my hardworking team at YSD who continue to impress me year in year out. Thank you for coming together for the benefit of the communities who need it most.

All YSD's work is driven by communities. Communities who are marginalised and need that helping hand. Communities who initiate impactful conservation and welfare work, who have the expertise but not the funding. Communities who are unaware that their actions can impact others positively. Communities who need that boost so that they are able to bring themselves and their families out of poverty. Communities who need and benefit from our sponsorships.



KEEPING OUR KIDS IN SCHOOL

In 2023, the report of nearly 30,000 Malaysian students not sitting for the SPM examinations prompted a heated debate, shedding light on the alarming dropout rates in the country. As a foundation committed to providing access to quality education, this issue hits close to home, further driving YSD's resolve to address this country-wide problem.

Since June 2021, YSD has been working closely with the Kedah State Government and the State Education Department (JPN) to address school disengagement and dropout issues in Kedah, with the expertise of Universiti Utara Malaysia (UUM), led by Prof Dr Rosna Awang Hashim. YSD's funding of RM450,000 has enabled UUM to accelerate actions on the ground, including policy enforcement and improvement, in line with the Malaysia Education Blueprint 2013-2025.

YSD's primary objective is to implement early interventions for identified at-risk students, with the ultimate aim of reducing school dropouts and increasing the number of students attending SPM examinations in Kedah. The success of the pilot project in Kedah is expected to pave the way for the replication of this project in other states across the country.



THE APPROACH:

- Inclusive early detection framework

- A 3-day motivational programme mentored by 83 **UUM** students
- December 2022, YSD and UUM received constructive feedback and commitments from the state representatives, JPN Kedah, schoolteachers, counsellors and PDRM
- MOE's SUDI 2.0 initiative had facilitated UUM's intervention module with key stakeholders and community leaders
- In February 2023, RM360,000 back-to-school aid were distributed to 1,800 students as part of the project's education engagement
- In July 2023, MyBuddy training sessions were conducted for JPN Kedah officers, District Education Offices (PPD) officers, and selected school counsellors

MENRAQ: A STORY OF INDIGENOUS CUSTODIANSHIP

YSD is taking proactive measures to support the urgent imperative of safeguarding the critically endangered Malayan Tiger in the Royal Belum State Park (RBSP). Persatuan Pelindung Harimau Malaysia (RIMAU) has thus received a sponsorship of RM1.2 million over three years to equip, train, and deploy two new Menrag patrol teams in addition to RIMAU's existing three teams to combat illegal poaching activities in the area.

Comprising Orang Asli youth from the Jahai tribe, Menraq will support the existing forest rangers under Perak State Park Corporation (PSPC) in their anti-poaching efforts in RBSP. Despite their limited literacy and numeracy skills, these youths exhibit impressive aptitude in mastering the advanced Smart Monitoring System technologies to support conservation efforts.

On top of tiger conservation, YSD's unique sponsorship also includes a stipend channelled to the village's community fund for the purchase of necessities and medication, among other things, while assisting those who have lost their jobs due to the pandemic. Consistent with YSD's dedication to providing access to quality education, 45 Orang Asli children are also being introduced to the Menraq Junior Rangers programme to inspire a new generation of wildlife protectors by improving their literacy levels and instilling a sense of interest in forest protection and biodiversity. Through YSD's support, RIMAU is conducting an outreach programme with 55 identified schools in Hulu Perak, including Sekolah Kebangsaan Sungai Tiang in RBSP, to distribute 1,000 copies of 'Hari Tanpa Ngauman' book to enhance their literacy levels through creative storytelling. YSD's support for RIMAU is intended to provide an alternative source of livelihood for the Jahai youths, which reflects YSD's commitment to conservation, sustainability, and inclusivity.





The survival of our invaluable wildlife teeters on the edge. Just within my lifetime, we've borne witness to the tragic extinctions of the Sumatran Rhino and the Leatherback Turtle. I refuse to let another iconic species, the Malayan Tiger, slip away. With the support of YSD, our mission at RIMAU to protect and safeguard these tigers gains even greater strength. At the heart of our collaboration is the empowering involvement of the Orang Asli, who play an integral role in biodiversity conservation in RBSP as the protectors of the rainforest's biodiversity. Through our collaboration with YSD, we strive not only to secure the survival of our precious wildlife but also to uplift the indigenous communities, creating a community-based solution to preserve the delicate balance of our ecosystem.

With YSD's support, we toured half of Peninsular Malaysia, bringing our Whale-On-The-Wheels Mobile Marine Education Nationwide Tour to local schools, towns, communities, and cities.

In 2019, we were also able to conduct a mini survey to confirm the presence of Bryde's whales in the offshore waters of Kedah, but it wasn't until the funding support from YSD in 2021 that we were able to really grow MareCet's WHALE Project and collect vital information about the ecology and behaviour of these majestic creatures."

BEAUTY IN PERIL: CINTAI TIOMAN CAMPAIGN AIMS TO SAFEGUARD A NATURAL WONDER

YSD ramped up the Cintai Tioman campaign with Reef Check Malaysia (RCM) and Juara Turtle Project (JTP) to raise public awareness on the need to protect and sustain the ecological and social resilience of Pulau Tioman, a popular tourist destination off the coast of Peninsular Malaysia. The island is currently on its way to being certified and recognised as one of Malaysia's first on the International Union for Conservation of Nature (IUCN) Green List of Protected and Conserved Areas.

As part of the campaign, YSD brought together YSD Eco Citizen volunteers from Sime Darby Plantation, Sime Darby Berhad, and Sime Darby Property, to Pulau Tioman to participate in beach clean-ups, coral planting, and preparation of coral blocks and recycling bins.

The trip also marked the official launch of the YSD Eco Citizen programme, an employee volunteering initiative aimed at engaging Sime Darby employees in environmental conservation efforts and fostering a sense of environmental stewardship among participants.

Through YSD's decade-long partnership with RCM, the Tioman Marine Conservation Group (TMCG) was established, consisting of local islanders passionate about marine and island conservation. The group has made significant contributions by collecting recyclables and conducting environmental awareness programmes

on the island. The TMCG also receives training to set up their own recycling business, thus being a part of YSD's efforts at increasing alternative sources of livelihood. Additionally, the collaboration between YSD and JTP has increased the chances of survival for vulnerable sea turtles.

EXTENDING DISASTER RELIEF AID IN MALAYSIA AND BEYOND

YSD provided emergency assistance to those affected by disasters together with our project partners, including Sime Darby employee volunteers, by committing close to RM2 million in aid, supporting flood victims in Kelantan, Terengganu, Pahang, and Johor, as well as assisting families whose homes were destroyed during the recent high tide phenomenon in Sandakan, Sabah.

In response to the devastating earthquakes in southern Türkiye and northwest Syria in February 2023, YSD swiftly committed a total of RM3 million from the YSD Disaster Relief Fund 2022/2023 towards relief efforts in the affected region.

YSD's commitment to humanitarian aid was affirmed during a mock cheque handover ceremony at Seri Perdana on 14 February 2023, graced by Prime Minister Datuk Seri Anwar Ibrahim. YSD announced a donation of RM1.5 million to support humanitarian efforts through the Tabung Bencana Kementerian Luar Negeri (TBKLN), which forms part of the Malaysian government's commitment to help those affected by the disaster.

An additional RM1.5 million was committed to MERCY Malaysia's emergency response and recovery initiatives in the affected areas. The funding covered essential expenses, including medical supplies, water and sanitation services, hygiene (WASH) services, and the deployment of emergency medical response teams in both affected countries.





THE CHANGEMAKERS FOR GENDER EQUALITY IN MALAYSIA

The Women's Aid Organisation (WAO) made massive waves in October 2022 when the Anti-Sexual Harassment Bill 2022 was finally gazetted as an Act. With the staunch support of YSD for WAO, together with the formidable front of the Anti-Sexual Harassment Coalition, the Bill was first tabled in Parliament in 2021, where it was passed in July 2022, and now many sections of the Act are already in force.

YSD has been supporting WAO for more than a decade, with a total sponsorship of RM8.7 million from 2010 to 2025. The funding has enabled WAO to complement the government's work in reforming various national policies, developing guidelines to improve existing laws, and proposing new laws in support of gender equality in the country.

In the current sponsorship phase, WAO has made further progress in the fight for a better Malaysia, pushing forward the Anti-Stalking Bill, which has successfully been passed in Parliament to be incorporated into the Penal Code. YSD remains steadfast in our commitment to supporting action-oriented research and analysis, fostering engagements with key policymakers, conducting public campaigns, and providing training programmes for both the public and private sectors. We look forward to the effective implementation of the recently gazetted laws to improve the rights and well-being of all Malaysians.

POWERING THE TRACK CYCLING SCENE IN MALAYSIA

Following the success of YSD's long-term support for the elite athletes of the national track cycling team on their journey to represent Malaysia on the world stage which is ultimately the Olympics, YSD embarked on a new initiative to stimulate the development of the national talent pool of track cyclists.

YSD, in partnership with the Foundation for Malaysian Sporting Excellence (SportExcel), launched the YSD Track Series (YSDTS) programme in December 2022 at the National Velodrome in Nilai, Negeri Sembilan. The programme was officially launched by YB Hannah Yeoh,

Minister of Youth and Sports, and Y.A.M. Tunku Tan Sri Imran, YSD and SportExcel Chairman, with the renowned Mr. John Beasley, the High-Performance Director of Majlis Sukan Negara (MSN) and Technical Advisor of YSDTS.

With the support of MSN and the Malaysian National Cycling Federation, YSDTS intends to boost an interest in track cycling among local young cyclists and encourage the formation of local professional track cycling teams, with the racing series serving as the first-of-its-kind avenue for national talent scouting.

EMPOWERING GIRLS IN RUGBY: YSD'S GAME-CHANGING SUPPORT FOR GENDER EQUALITY AND SPORTS DEVELOPMENT IN MALAYSIA

YSD's collaboration with Malaysia Rugby (MR) with RM1.4 million sponsorship until March 2023 began in August 2019, with YSD sponsoring the National Rugby Development Programme (NRDP) for the Men's U-19 & U-20 and Women's U-20 elite teams.

YSD's support has been instrumental in addressing the disparities in rugby development in Malaysia caused by economic disadvantages and cultural norms. The programme challenges the notion of rugby as solely a men's sport, empowering over 600 young women to participate and excel regardless of socioeconomic background. The programme takes a holistic approach by identifying and nurturing talented athletes through initiatives like Talent Scouting and Elite Training Camps and providing the women the opportunity to represent Malaysia internationally through competitive exposure tournaments.

As part of our commitment to advancing women and girls in sports, YSD is fully dedicated to promoting gender equality and ensuring that women and girls have equitable opportunities to participate in all sports disciplines, including the traditionally male-dominated realm of rugby. Our funding plays a pivotal role in fostering the growth of both male and female rugby talents, propelling MR's progress in skill development, and significantly contributing to the nation's talent pool.

YSD takes great pride in supporting an inspiring and inclusive project under our sponsorship, Parastoo Theatre, a refugee-founded and led theatre troupe based in Kuala Lumpur. In July 2022, YSD supported the production of 'And Then Came Spring' in collaboration with Instant Café Theatre. Led by the visionary theatre director Saleh Sepas, the play focuses on empowering refugees and fostering professional cooperation between refugees and the local community in Malaysia.

Parastoo Theatre utilises the 'Theatre of the Oppressed' method to educate, build coalitions, and drive legislative change. By training refugees as actors, producers, and technicians, the theatre troupe actively engages the underrepresented community in meaningful dialogues, powering a more inclusive society.

In 'And Then Came Spring' YSD had supported 15 actors who are refugees from Afghanistan, Syria, Myanmar, and Palestine. For the upcoming production, 'Red Soil of Kabul', YSD will be supporting 16 actors who are also refugees, providing them with opportunities for self-expression and self-confidence.

Notes to the Financial Statements

For the financial year ended 30 June 2023

1 GENERAL INFORMATION

The Yayasan is principally engaged in receiving and administering funds to award scholarships or loans for educational purposes, promote recreational and sporting activities, undertake environmental conservation and sustainability projects and other related activities for the benefit of the community. There was no significant change in the nature of these activities during the financial year.

The Yayasan is incorporated in Malaysia as a company limited by guarantee and does not have a share capital.

2 BASIS OF PREPARATION

The financial statements of the Yayasan have been prepared in accordance with the Malaysian Financial Reporting Standards ("MFRS"), International Financial Reporting Standards and the requirements of the Companies Act 2016 in Malaysia. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

The financial statements are presented in Ringgit Malaysia (RM), which is the Yayasan's functional currency. All assets and liabilities of the Yayasan are denominated in Ringgit Malaysia unless disclosed otherwise.

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with MFRS requires the use of certain critical accounting estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements, and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reported period. It also requires management to exercise their judgement in the process of applying the Yayasan's accounting policies. Although these estimates and judgement are based on the management's best knowledge of current events and actions, actual results may differ from those estimates. The areas involving a higher degree of judgement or complexity, or areas where assumptions and estimates are significant to the financial statements are disclosed in Note 4 to the financial statements.

During the financial year, the Yayasan has considered the new accounting pronouncements in the preparation of the financial statements.

3 SUMMARY OF PRINCIPAL ACCOUNTING POLICIES

These principal accounting policies have been applied consistently in dealing with items that are considered material in relation to the financial statements, and to all the financial years presented, unless otherwise stated.

- (a) Foreign currencies
 - (i) Functional and presentation currency

Items included in the financial statements of the Yayasan are measured using the currency of the primary economic environment in which the entity operates, i.e. the functional currency. The financial statements are presented in Ringgit Malaysia, which is the Yayasan's functional and presentation currency.

(ii) <u>Transactions and balances</u>

Foreign currency transactions and monetary items are translated into the functional currency using the exchange rates prevailing at the transaction dates and at the end of the reporting period, respectively. Foreign exchange differences arising therefrom and on settlement are recognised in the profit or loss.

For the financial year ended 30 June 2023 (continued)

3 SUMMARY OF PRINCIPAL ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

(b) Plant and equipment

Plant and equipment are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation and accumulated impairment losses. Cost includes expenditure that is directly attributable to the acquisition of an asset or part of an asset. The carrying amount of the replaced part is derecognised and all repairs and maintenance costs are charged to the profit or loss during the financial year in which they are incurred.

Plant and equipment are depreciated on a straight-line basis to write down the cost or valuation of each asset to their residual values over their estimated useful lives. The principal annual depreciation rates are:

Office equipment 20% to 33.33%
Furniture and fittings 20%
Plant and machinery 20%
Motor vehicle 33.33%

The assets' residual values and useful lives are reviewed, and adjusted if appropriate, annually.

The carrying amount of an item of plant and equipment is derecognised on disposal or when no future economic benefits are expected from its use or disposal. The difference between the net disposal proceeds, if any, and the carrying amount is recognised in the profit or loss.

(c) Leases

Leases are recognised as right-of-use ("ROU") asset and a corresponding liability at the date on which the leased asset is available for use by the Yayasan (i.e. the commencement date).

The Yayasan assesses at contract inception whether a contract is, or contains, a lease. A contract is or contains a lease if the contract conveys the right to control the use of an identified asset for a period of time in exchange for consideration.

Contracts may contain both lease and non-lease components. The Yayasan allocates the consideration in the contract to the lease and non-lease components based on their relative stand-alone prices. However, for leases of properties for which the Yayasan is a lessee, it has elected the practical expedient provided in MFRS 16 not to separate lease and non-lease components. Both components are accounted for as a single lease component and payments for both components are included in the measurement of lease liability.

In determining the lease term, the Yayasan considers all facts and circumstances that create an economic incentive to exercise an extension option, or not to exercise a termination option. Extension options (or periods after termination options) are only included in the lease term if the lease is reasonably certain to be extended (or not to be terminated).

The Yayasan reassesses the lease term upon the occurrence of a significant event or change in circumstances that is within the control of the Yayasan and affects whether the Yayasan is reasonably certain to exercise an option not previously included in the determination of lease term, or not to exercise an option previously included in the determination of lease term. A revision in the lease term results in a remeasurement of lease liabilities. See accounting policy in Note 3(c)(ii) on reassessment of lease liabilities.

3 SUMMARY OF PRINCIPAL ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

- (c) Leases (continued)
 - (i) ROU assets

ROU assets are initially measured at cost comprising the following:

- The amount of the initial measurement of lease liability;
- Any lease payments made at or before the commencement date less any lease incentive received;
- Any initial direct costs; and
- Decommissioning or restoration costs.

ROU assets that are not investment properties are subsequently measured at cost, less accumulated depreciation and accumulated impairment loss. In addition, the ROU assets are adjusted for certain remeasurement of lease liabilities. ROU assets are generally depreciated over the shorter of the asset's useful life and the lease term on a straight-line basis. If the Yayasan is reasonably certain to exercise a purchase option, the ROU asset is depreciated over the underlying asset's useful life.

(ii) Lease liabilities

Lease liabilities are initially measured at the present value of the lease payments that are not paid at that date. The lease payments include the following:

- Fixed payments (including in-substance fixed payments), less any lease incentive receivable:
- Variable lease payments that are based on an index or a rate, initially measured using the index or rate as at the commencement date;
- Amounts expected to be payable by the Yayasan under residual value guarantees;
- The exercise price of a purchase and extension options if the Yayasan is reasonably certain to exercise that option; and
- Payments of penalties for terminating the lease, if the lease term reflects the Yayasan exercising that option.

Lease payments are discounted using the interest rate implicit in the lease. If that rate cannot be readily determined, which is generally the case for leases in the Yayasan, the lessee's incremental borrowing is used. This is the rate that the individual lessee would have to pay to borrow the funds necessary to purchase an asset of similar value to the ROU in a similar economic environment with a similar term, security and conditions.

The finance cost is charged to profit or loss over the lease period so as to produce a constant periodic rate of interest on the remaining balance of the liability for each period.

The Yayasan presents the lease liabilities as a separate line item in the statement of financial position. Interest expense on the lease liability is presented within the finance cost in the statement of comprehensive income and expenditure.

(c) Leases (continued)

(iii) Short term leases and leases of low value assets

The Yayasan has elected not to recognise right-of-use assets and lease liabilities for short term leases that have a lease term of 12 months or less and leases of low-value assets. The Yayasan recognises the lease payments associated with these leases as an expense on a straight-line basis over the lease term.

(d) Financial assets

The Yayasan classifies its financial assets at amortised cost when the asset is held within an entity model with the objective to collect contractual cash flows and the contractual terms give rise to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest ("SPPI").

Financial assets of the Yayasan which fall under this category are loans receivable from defaulted scholars and students, deposits, cash and cash equivalents, and endowment fund receivable.

At initial recognition, the Yayasan measure a financial asset at its fair value plus transaction costs that are directly attributable to the acquisition of the financial asset. Interest income from these financial assets is included in finance income using the effective interest rate method. Any gain or loss arising on derecognition is recognised directly in profit or loss together with the related foreign exchange gains and losses. Impairment losses are presented as a separate line item in the statement of comprehensive income and expenditure.

The Yayasan's financial assets are categorised as receivables.

Financial assets with fixed or determinable payments that are not quoted in an active market are classified as receivables. These financial assets are recorded at fair value plus transaction costs and thereafter, they are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method less accumulated impairment losses.

Financial assets are classified as current assets for those having maturity dates of less than 12 months after the reporting date, and the balance is classified as non-current.

(e) Financial liabilities

The Yayasan's financial liabilities are categorised as other financial liabilities and are recognised initially at fair value plus transaction costs and thereafter, at amortised cost using the effective interest method. Amortisation is charged to profit or loss.

Financial liabilities are classified as current liabilities for those having maturity dates of less than 12 months after the reporting date, and the balance is classified as non-current.

For the financial year ended 30 June 2023 (continued)

3 SUMMARY OF PRINCIPAL ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

(f) Impairment

The Yayasan recognises an allowance for expected credit loss ("ECL") for all debt instruments not held at fair value through profit and loss. ECLs are based on the difference between the contractual cash flows due in accordance with the contract and all the cash flows that the Yayasan expects to receive, discounted at an approximation of the original effective interest rate.

The expected cash flows will include cash flows from the sale of collateral held or other credit enhancements that are integral to the contractual terms.

While cash and cash equivalents are also subject to the impairment requirements of MFRS 9, the identified impairment loss is immaterial.

ECLs are measured based on a general 3-stage approach.

General 3-stage approach for loans receivable

ECLs are recognised in two stages. For credit exposures for which there has not been a significant increase in credit risk since initial recognition, ECLs are provided for credit losses that result from default events that are possible within the next 12 months (a 12-month ECL).

For those credit exposures for which there has been a significant increase in credit risk since initial recognition, a loss allowance is required for credit losses expected over the remaining life of the exposure, irrespective of the timing of the default (a lifetime ECL).

Significant increase in credit risk

The Yayasan considers the probability of default upon initial recognition of asset and whether there has been a significant increase in credit risk on an ongoing basis throughout each reporting period. To assess whether there is a significant increase in credit risk, the Yayasan compares the risk of a default occurring on the asset as at the reporting date with the risk of default as at the date of initial recognition. The assessment considers available, reasonable and supportable forward-looking information such as:

- internal credit rating/assessment;
- actual or expected significant adverse changes in financial or economic conditions that are expected to cause a significant change to the debtor's ability to meet its obligations;
- significant changes in the value of the collateral supporting the obligation or in the quality of thirdparty guarantees; or
- significant changes in the expected performance and behavior of the debtor, including changes in the payment status of debtor.

Notwithstanding of the analysis above, a significant increase in credit risk is presumed if a debtor is more than 90 days past due in making a contractual payment.

For the financial year ended 30 June 2023 (continued)

3 SUMMARY OF PRINCIPAL ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

(f) Impairment (continued)

Definition of default

The Yayasan considers the loans receivable from students as being in default when the students failed to make contractual payment within 90 days of when they fall due, based on the repayment schedule set out in the loans agreements. A financial asset is written off to statement of comprehensive income and expenditure when there is no reasonable expectation of recovering the contractual cash flows.

Loans and receivables are assessed individually and thereafter collectively for objective evidence of impairment. If evidence exists, the amount of impairment loss is measured as the difference between the asset's carrying amount and the present value of estimated future cash flows discounted at the asset's original effective interest rate. The impairment loss is recognised in profit or loss. Reversal of impairment loss to profit or loss, if any, is restricted to not resulting in the carrying amount of the financial asset that exceeds what the amortised cost would have been had the impairment not been recognised previously.

(g) Inventories

Inventories are merchandise purchased for giveaways during events held for Corporate Social Responsibility activities and are stated at cost. The cost will be charged out to the profit or loss when the merchandise is given away.

(h) Employee costs

(i) Short-term employee benefits

Wages, salaries, paid annual leave and sick leave, bonuses and non-monetary benefits are accrued in the period in which the services are rendered by employees.

(ii) Defined contribution pension plans

A defined contribution plan is a pension plan under which the Yayasan pays fixed contributions into a separate entity. The Yayasan has no legal or constructive obligations to pay further contributions if the fund does not hold sufficient assets to pay all employees the benefits relating to employee service in the current and prior periods.

The Yayasan's contributions to defined contribution plans are charged to profit or loss in the financial year in which they relate.

For the financial year ended 30 June 2023 (continued)

3 SUMMARY OF PRINCIPAL ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

(i) Cash and cash equivalents

For the purpose of the statement of cash flows, cash and cash equivalents include cash in hand and deposits held at call with banks and other short term investments with original maturity of 3 months or less that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value.

(j) Revenue recognition

Revenue is recognised by reference to each distinct performance obligation in the contract with customer. Depending on the substance of the contract, revenue is recognised when the performance obligation is satisfied, which may be at a point in time or over time.

Donations from Sime Darby Berhad, Sime Darby Plantation Berhad and Sime Darby Property Berhad are recognised in the statement of comprehensive income and expenditure when the Yayasan is entitled to the donations. Other donations are recognised as income upon receipt.

Interest income is recognised on an accrual basis, using the effective interest method.

(k) Scholarship

Scholarship expenses are recognised at the time when the obligation becomes due and payable. Loans receivable are recognised in the Statement of Financial Position when scholars or former scholars breached the conditions set out in the scholarship agreements. The amounts recoverable are recognised initially at fair value. Subsequent to initial recognition, they are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less impairment losses, if any.

(I) Government grants

Government grants are recognised at fair value when there is reasonable assurance that the Yayasan will comply with the conditions attached to them and the grants will be received. Government grants relating to costs are recognised in statement of comprehensive income and loss over the periods to match the related costs for which the grants are intended to compensate.

(m) Contingent liabilities

The Yayasan does not recognise contingent liabilities but discloses their existence in the notes to the financial statements. A contingent liability is a possible obligation that arises from past events whose crystallisation will be confirmed by the occurrence or non-occurrence of one or more uncertain future events beyond the control of the Yayasan or a present obligation that is not recognised because it is not probable that an outflow of resources will be required to settle the obligation. A contingent liability also arises in the extremely rare circumstances where there is a liability that is not recognised because it cannot be measured reliably.

For the financial year ended 30 June 2023 (continued)

4 CRITICAL ACCOUNTING ESTIMATES AND JUDGEMENT IN APPLYING ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with MFRS requires the use of certain critical accounting estimates that involve complex and subjective judgements and the use of assumptions, some of which may be for matters that are inherently uncertain and susceptible to change. The Directors exercise their judgement in the process of applying the Yayasan's accounting policies. Estimates and assumptions are based on the Directors' best knowledge of current events. Such estimates and judgement could change from period to period and have a material impact on the results, financial position, cash flows and other disclosures.

The estimates and assumptions that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial year are outlined below:

(a) Impairment of receivables

Impairment is made for loans receivable that the management considers the expected credit losses of individual loans, and its recoverability is doubtful. On a regular basis, the management reviews the loans receivable' ageing report and repayment history for any significant increase in credit risk as presented in Note 3(f).

5 FINANCIAL RISK MANAGEMENT AND CAPITAL MANAGEMENT

(a) Financial risk management

The financial risk management of the Yayasan is carried out under policies approved by the Governing Council. Financial risk management is carried out through risk reviews, internal control systems and adherence to Group Policies and Authorities. The Governing Council regularly reviews the risks and approves the policies covering the management of these risks.

Interest rate risk

Interest rate risk is the risk that the fair value of the future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate because of changes in market interest rates. The Yayasan's income and operating cash flows are substantially independent of changes in market interest rates. Interest rates exposures arise from deposits placed with licensed banks and other financial institutions which are short term in nature and earn market interest rates.

Currency risk

Currency risk arises when transactions are denominated in foreign currencies. The Yayasan make payments for tuition fees and living expenses for overseas scholars in foreign currency which are translated at spot rates when expected to be incurred. The Yayasan is not exposed to significant foreign currency risk as its financial assets and liabilities are denominated in Ringgit Malaysia.

(a) Financial risk management (continued)

Liquidity risk

Liquidity risk is the risk that the Yayasan will encounter difficulties in meeting its financial obligations due to insufficient funds. The Yayasan maintains sufficient cash and cash equivalents to enable it to meet its operational obligations when they fall due.

The table below analyses the financial liabilities of the Yayasan into relevant maturity groupings based on the remaining period from the reporting date to the contractual maturity date. Credit risk

Credit risk refers to the risk that counterparty will default on its contractual obligations resulting in financial loss to the Yayasan. Receivables are secured by guarantee from third parties.
